In August 2017, an 86 year old widow, Mrs. W. was sent to rehab temporarily. During her stay, several volunteers provided over 250 man-hours in the renovation of her home, in order to make it more accessible and provide cosmetic upgrades. Before and after photos are at the end of the newsletter.

The following work was performed:

☐ The interior of the house was painted.

Painting was provided by Christian Medical Ministry of Alabama at Briarwood Church. **Special thank you's to the Executive Director, Bobby Parks and his wife Jan.** Jan Parks helped wash dishes, line kitchen cabinets, and painted for over 6 hours (Wonder Woman!).

Also, I want to highly commend the medical students who painted and cleared the house of trash and excess furniture: Zach Sollie; Bennett Parker; and Emory Builta. **And a very special thank you to Shelby Builta, who coordinated the project.**

The paint was donated by Law Lamar the Founder of The Friends of Hale County, a local non-profit. His generosity contributed to the most visible improvement to the condition of the home.

Ricky Pierce and Claude Yates painted all of the trim work and finished painting the kitchen and the metal cabinet beneath the farmhouse sink.

□ Safety and Security Work

The electrical outlets and light fixtures were repaired and replaced by Ricky Pierce and Claude Yates. Most of the home's electrical outlets did not work and four (4) rooms did not have working ceiling lights.

The condition of the non-working electrical outlets was a danger to Mrs. Willie Mae's health and safety.

A chair lift from the main living area to the basement garage was facilitated by Chris Jones, Home Modification Coordinator, with the Disability Rights and Resources group.


New grab bars for the bathroom tub and toilet were donated by Law Lamar.




